

SOLID AS A ROCK

“Everything is a Warm-up!”

Briggs Parry understands the importance of team practices. He is the team manager of the Groves High School varsity football team in Beverly Hills, MI. Every drill, every practice is a warm-up for game day, and even the game is a warm-up for the next game. Briggs sees this as a metaphor for his own approach to life... everything is a warm-up! It's his motto for facing challenges.

Briggs started facing challenges at the young age of 4 months when he suffered an injury that stopped his heart & breathing for several minutes. The resulting brain damage affected his ability to walk, use his hands, and talk... but, not his ability to think, socialize, and communicate with others. Briggs is currently a senior in high school. He has been involved in therapy all of his life. His parents, Julie & Greg, heard about Bay Cliff when Briggs was 14 and knew the intensive therapy he would receive here would help him grow stronger and become more independent.

In his four summers at Bay Cliff, Briggs has done just that. His therapists have always found Briggs to be a goal-setter and a hard worker in therapy and in the Teen Program at camp. “Three of my goals,” says Briggs, “were to walk farther distances with the assistance of my walker, learn to walk without my walker, and swim better.” Briggs pushed himself, beyond expectation, to walk unassisted with ever-increasing goals of distance as summer progressed. His determination was exemplary. “I wanted to set a good example for the younger campers,” Briggs states. “Through the Teen Program I learned adult responsibilities, and it helped move me closer to independence.” With his steady approach, his balance improved & his endurance increased. “As Briggs was achieving his goals, I could tell he was in the best shape of his life,” says physical therapist, Christy Osborn. “It was time for Briggs to take himself to an even higher level.”

The challenge was to climb Thomas Rock, a nearby scenic area. It was a mile hike through the woods on uneven ground, over rocks, up 40 steep consecutive stairs. Briggs faced the challenge without hesitation - and without his walker. “With much grunting and grinding, I made it to the top independently. I

felt like the king of the castle. It was a wonderful feeling that I will never forget!” As Briggs often says, “Everything is a warm-up!” It was certainly a warm-up for walking to his mother at the end of camp. “She cried tears of joy!” As Julie recalls, “It was so cool to see him walking towards me and the progress he made. Briggs uses his walker in the crowded school hallway, but continues to walk on his own ... even the length of the football field with the team!” With his rock-solid attitude that everything you do now prepares you for whatever you do next, Briggs is on top of his game!

A proud but humble Briggs reflects, “Thank you, Bay Cliff, for allowing me to conquer my disability and become the best I can be.”


All funds donated through the Campership Appeal will be used specifically for the Children's Summer Therapy program.





Memories to Last a Lifetime

When Charles Dzarnowski returned to Bay Cliff, after having been a camper in the 1940's, he talked about his favorite counselor, Mr. Johnny. "He was like an older brother to me." John Bullock served on the camp staff for 20 years, including 8 years as Camp Director. When asked if he remembered Charles, Mr. Johnny enthusiastically responded, "Oh, Chuck! He was a Raccoon in 1948!" How's that for memories!

Chuck was a camper for 7 years. He was one of the 27 children who stayed in the Big House in the winter of 1940-41 as a result of the polio epidemic that filled Upper Peninsula hospitals beyond capacity. His rehabilitation continued with therapy at camp. He even rode his bike from Iron River to Bay Cliff in 1952 as a fundraiser for camp! Chuck went on to pursue a career in business and build his life and family in the Chicago area. Mr. Johnny went on to serve others as an Occupational Therapist for 30 years, first with Easter Seals, and then at the Michigan School for the Blind. When he retired, he moved back to his home town of Marquette, always staying in touch with Bay Cliff.

The effects of polio often return in what is known as post-polio syndrome. For Chuck, Bay Cliff's Post-Polio Wellness Retreat, helps him understand he can do something about it. It was here at Bay Cliff that camper Chuck and counselor Mr. Johnny were re-united 60 years later. Now, whenever they get together, they reminisce for hours of building campsites, peeling potatoes, learning archery, weaving fabric on a string loom, crafting toys out of wood, and fun shared with the other Raccoons. "Chuck took an active part in everything," says Mr. Johnny. "He had the true Bay Cliff spirit, and he still has it!"


"Camp has changed over the years, with new buildings and such," says Chuck, "but what I remember most are my friends and my counselors." Mr. Johnny agrees. "It's not the material things that you remember; it's the relationships." Chuck recalls that "Remember" is the song we sing our last night at camp. "And, you remember when you're away!"
